Chairman's Report

This year has been a wonderful year for the VUSA Rugby Academy as Covid restrictions lifted and a semblance of normality returned to the programme. My grateful thanks go to the coaches and staff for their patience during the pandemic and the "can-do" attitude they showed in making sure that the children were able to thrive as best they could in often very difficult circumstances.

The education programme was the one that developed most this past year with a number of activities taking place that focused on the academic development of the children. This included a full second year of the "tuk tuk" mobile reading vehicle that provided much joy to so many through the books it took to the community. The partnership with Coronation, Atlas and the Digibus initiative had its first full year of operation and while initial teething problems had to be overcome, the bus is proving to be a wonderful asset, reaching many children with its innovative way of mobile teaching.

The rugby programme continued to do well and a highlight of the year was the participation of VUSA in the U13 Independent Schools Festival, hosted by Bishops. The team was superb, winning all of their games against some tough opposition, again highlighting that the talent that exists in our country only needs opportunity in order to shine through. The physical well-being of the players continues to be a priority and the partnership with the SPW programme at Bishops is highly valued.

VUSA is not just about rugby and the classroom. A number of outings and activities took place that tried to give each child a broad exposure to different skills. This included a very successful entrepreneurship programme, supported by Capitec, that ended in a Market Day that exposed the children to the real world of commerce, albeit in a protected space.

The VUSA programme continues to be supported by Bishops and our grateful thanks goes to the school community for all they do. The Prep PA continues to raise funds for VUSA and encourages boys from Bishops Prep and VUSA to work together in various areas. The College provided many opportunities for training from the 1st XV and also held a very successful Cyclethon where over R500 000 was raised by the Bishops community over 24 hours. Our grateful thanks go to Bishops for not only this support but also the administrative support they give by providing the necessary oversight and financial acumen.

The Board of Trustees is to be thanked for their ongoing support and we thank Geoff Brownell in particular who has supported Vusa as a Trustee since its inception in 2019. Geoff steps down from the Board and we welcome Ms Nosipho Poswa, Ms Kay Lala-Sides and Mr Stuart Abbott to the Board as new Trustees. We are certain that they will provide the expertise to continue to grow the programme.

I conclude by extending my very grateful thanks to our generous sponsors who give so much to VUSA. Words cannot truly express our thanks but a short visit to see the children in action goes a long way to explain the impact VUSA has on the children of Langa. My thanks go to the coaching staff and support staff of VUSA who always go the extra mile and to the three people who drive VUSA, Nikki Matthews, Brendan Fogarty and Mak Kahla – more passionate people would be hard to find and they are greatly appreciated.

2022 ECD Programme Overview

ECD Programme

Our partnership with Dalukhanyo, Nomonde and Gege's Creche continues to grow with VUSA's intervention introducing an English as a Second Language (ESL) programme focusing on numeracy and literacy development. In December 2021, 8 VUSA facilitators participated in a training course with Project Playgrounds language specialist, Mercedes Artigue, who developed this structured ESL programme piloted at St Anthony's Pre-School in Langa.

This programme has successfully been implemented at each of the three VUSA ECD centers this year, with year-end assessments demonstrating successful development in all topics covered. The programme introduces a weekly theme, consolidated through the daily play programme. VUSA has also piloted the Breteau Foundations, One Billion OneTab programme. This robust offline device teaches numeracy and literacy at the child's level.







Mobile Library

Not in our wildest dreams could we have imagined the joy this little vehicle would bring to 191 children in Langa every day. When Tata Lungile arrives at the creches, the children squeal with delight and more than once, we witness tears as he drives away. Lungile reads 2-3 stories to each centre daily, ensuring that he translates and often acts out the stories, capturing the children's imaginations and instilling a love for reading and books.

2022 After-School Programme

Rugby

There is little doubt that rugby is the drawcard to the after-school programme. Out of 108 children surveyed, 92% cited rugby and safety as their primary reasons for attendance. The children love and trust their coaches and are motivated as this programme gives them access to competitive sports through the WP Schools league and 7's tournaments. One of 2022's highlights was hosting our first 7s tournament in Langa which we hope to include as an annual fixture on our calendar. These games, provide our children with the the opportunity to meet new people at different schools and clubs each week. A highlight of the year was an invitation to the U13s to the Independent School's Rugby Festival, hosted by Bishops Diocesan Prep in July. Our children won all their matches. Whilst this speaks volumes about the standard of coaching, the most significant impact of this event was the confidence it gave our children. Our VUSA players know that their socio-economic background differs from most of their opponents but they also now believe this does not limit their abilities. We continue to grow the number of female players. Young girls are the community's most vulnerable members, and rugby empowers them on and off the field. It also demonstrates their strength to their male counterparts and provides teachable moments about gender equality and respect.







Academic Programme

The after-school academic programme, in partnership with Edunova, offers lessons in English and Maths using digital platforms that follow the CAPS curriculum (CAMI and Matiific). Programme-based assessments have indicated that 63% of children have seen an improvement in their academic progress this year. Whilst this could be attributed to more than after-school lessons, additional benefits of the programme are that children are safe and supervised, classes take place in smaller groups with a greater pupil-teacher ratio, and each child receives a hot, nutritious meal at the end of the day.

Pop-Up Library

Every Friday afternoon, the pop-up library is set up at Ikhaya le Langa for children to take home a book. Books include English and isiXhosa books. Whilst the children love to take out books, 98% of those surveyed said they would prefer someone to read the book with them. A 2016 Progress in International Reading Literacy (PIRLS) study, which tested the reading comprehension of learners in Grade 4 found that 78% of South African pupils at this level could not read for meaning. It is imperative that more of our resources are directed to assisting with reading, both in the mother-tongue and English.








Food

Poor nutrition in childhood can result in cognitive, physical, social and emotional developmental delays. Thanks to Shoprite and Checkers (We Act for Change) and the Lunchbox Fund, each child who attends the after-school programme is offered a hot, nutritious daily meal.













2022 Recreational Programme Overview

Recreational Outings

The recreational programme creates new experiences for our children. Most outings planned are in partnership with Bishops Prep and see the boys experiencing new places whilst meeting children from different races, religions and socioeconomic groups. This year's expeditions included a morning at Fish Hoek Beach, an Easter Egg hunt and Easter craft morning at Bishops Prep, two outings to the Norval Foundation (thanks to Culture Connect and Coronation Fund Managers), an excursion to Green Point stadium with mentors and role-models (the Ubumbo Legends and the Stormers) and a day trip around Cape Town on the red bus, for our Under 13s as part of the Independent Schools Rugby Festival.







Christmas Party

Our annual Christmas party hosted by the Bishops Gr6 & Gr7 families and supported by Shoprite Checkers was another magical, fun-filled afternoon with VUSA and Bishops children playing and interacting, delicious food and beautiful Christmas gift packs filled with amazing gifts!

2022 Atlas Digibus Overview







The Atlas Digibus

It was with great excitement that we launched the unique Atlas Digibus project at the beginning of 2022. This mobile classroom, fitted with solar panels, 37 laptops and two teaching stations, was donated to VUSA by the Atlas Foundation.

The morning programmes, funded by Coronation Fund Managers, address the transition from mother-tongue learning to English for Grade 4 learners at the five schools in Langa. The afternoon programme uses the Matific programme to support learners with Maths using this engaging platform.

The project has been challenging, but the programme has had some pleasing results despite this.

Each of the 14 class averages has improved by a minimum of 20% since the start of the year. The baseline tests covered content taught in the English and Maths CAPS curriculum.

Fine motor skills proved to be a challenge for children using computers (some for the first time). Scrolling on the mouse and clicking on individual keys was difficult for some learners. Teaching basic computer skills also hindered the development of teaching language and mathematical concepts. To address this, in 2023, the programme will extend to include a coding programme for Grade 3 learners. This will mean that when they reach Grade 4, they will already be comfortable using the laptops and the teachers can focus on the core subjects.

Programme Highlights:

- Significant improvement in internal assessments.
- Transfer of skills to interns and school teachers to be used in the classroom
- Children love using digital programmes to learn seeing children so excited about learning is wonderful.

CAPITEC/ SHOPRITE MARKET DAY







In July and August, 40 U13s attended weekly entrepreneurial workshops with staff from Capitec's retail, marketing and financial education teams. They worked through a series of marketing-related modules. These included creating a business idea and identifying needs and target markets through to financial literacy and marketing a business.

These workshops culminated in a market day, thanks to incredible organizations such as Capitec, Shoprite and Nomu, who "invested" in the children's businesses. The children set up stalls and sold everything from pot plants to pancakes.

Whilst not all teams made a profit, 40 children learnt a lot about starting something from scratch, partnerships, teamwork, budgeting, and marketing.

Impact:

One of the girls took her profits, purchased doughnuts she sold at School the next week, and doubled her earnings. One team used their profits and set up a bead stall at the Pop-up collective's market at Morganhof.



2023 GOALS



Our goals for 2023 are to ensure that we improve and fine-tune the daily delivery of the various aspects of our programme. We keep seeking new opportunities for partnerships and collaboration. These relationships are essential to ensuring that we uplift the standards of education, nutrition, physical health, and emotional wellbeing. These are fundamental building blocks to growing functional, contributing, and successful adults.

ECD ESL Programme

With the support of committed volunteers, this programme will ensure that learners remain engaged outside of the times VUSA runs programmes at the ECD centres. Volunteers create structured activity boxes and work with centre staff to deliver the activities thereby ensuring skills transfer and ongoing daily engagement for the children. We also hope to introduce the Early Learning Outcomes Measure (ELOM) which is assessed by external assessors. ELOM Assessments will provide each centre with a report of what stage their children are at developmentally.

Atlas Digibus

A lot of teaching time was taken at the beginning of the year when children were introduced to laptops. The Grade 4 learners had no experience on digital devices and lacked the fine motor skills to navigate the laptop or mouse. As such, in 2023 we will introduce a coding programme for Grade 3 learners so that learners are equipped to learn digitally when they reach Grade 4.

Peer Learning

The recreational programme with Prep School learners has meant children from two very different environments can meet and engage. This year we have worked with College Boys in the Big Ideas programme, who have introduced a volunteer programme which will give College boys the opportunity to go to Langa and coach rugby and assist with tutoring in the after-school programme.


We thank you for your generous support this year.


