EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

VUSA Rugby and Learning Academy

VUSA is a structured after school programme for primary school children in the Langa community. The programme currently offers sport (primarily rugby), academic support (English and Maths), recreational outings and a daily hot meal. VUSA also supports three registered ECD centres in Langa developing numeracy and literacy skills.

Problem the project is trying to solve

South Africa has an unequal education system with many schools dealing with overcrowded classrooms, staff absenteeism and poor academic outcomes, leading to a high drop-out rate which perpetuates the cycle of poverty. This has been exacerbated by COVID.

Project approach to solving the problem

The Atlas Foundation will be donating a 42 seater bus, fitted with 40 laptops and 2 teaching stations to VUSA. In collaboration with leading boys school, Bishops Diocesan College, VUSA will be able to extend it's impact in the Langa community and move closer to our goal of delivering excellent education to children in Langa.

Through our partnership with Bishops Diocesan College, this Digital mobile bus unit would allow us to make a more meaningful impact in Langa making world class resources available to the Langa Community.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

- Attendance records show the number of participants impacted by the programme and frequency of attendance.
- Questionnaires and focus groups will be used to determine need and impact.
- CAMI programme currently tracks each participants progress.
- Base Line Tests will be used to record efficacy of ESL programmes.
- School Reports identify need and show progress.

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OVERVIEW

VUSA (The isiXhosa word for awaken) is a registered NPO which offers social upliftment for children in the Langa Community in Cape Town. As the programme has developed. greater needs have been identified. The root cause of the challenges that some of our youth face such as poor mental physical and health. addiction, homelessness, crime and family breakdown are often attributed to deficiencies in early childhood leading to inactive citizens and perpetuating the poverty cycle. The VUSA programme offers children in the Langa community a safe space which provides access to sports, academic support (in Maths and English), recreational outings, a hot daily meal and access to our caring staff (members of the Langa community) who act as teachers, coaches and mentors.

EXTENDED ACCESSIBILITY

Covid had a significant impact globally but the impact on poorer communities in South Africa has been devastating. Our partner organisation, Bishops Diocesan College was able to quickly adapt to online learning whilst children from the Langa schools lost most of the 2020 academic year (many schools in Langa are still not back full time).

VUSA currently runs programmes school venues utilisina and municipal sports fields. When lockdown occurred, we had no space from which to support our children. Whilst our ECD partners provided us with a space to distribute a daily meal and hard English and Maths copy worksheets to provide academic support, it was a stark reminder that if VUSA is to continue to make significant impact the а in community, especially in times of such great need, VUSA needs to extend accessibility to the children we work with, ensuring that we not 100% reliant on the are facilities we utilise to provide the programmes so desperately required in the community - so was born the Atlas Digibus

THE CHALLENGES

LEARNING & LANGUAGE BARRIERS

The South African Institute of Race Relations (IRR) has released a new report on whether the current state-run school system aids or stunts the development of South African learners. "The data in this report shows that, among other things, only 33% of Grade 12 candidates 'passed' Maths with a grade of 40% or higher. A 2016 Progress in International Reading Literacy (PIRLS) study which tested reading comprehension of learners in Grade 4 found that 78% of South African pupils at this level could not read for meaning."

One of the contributing factors for this is a language barrier. Children learn in their mother tongue through the foundation phase of schooling and when they reach Grade 4, they convert to learning in English. Whilst this is a global language it will only benefit the child, if they are able to competently read and write in it.

This carries over to all subjects. South Africa's drop-out rate is a staggering 40% of which 17% of pupils site poor academic performance as their primary reason for leaving school.

Facilities

As we know township schools are already running at full capacity. Staff are overwhelmed with classes of 40+ students. Learners who are experiencing difficulties fall further behind. Whilst teachers would welcome support with morning programmes, most schools do not have available classroom space from which to run these programmes.

Covid

Whilst VUSA runs academic lessons in the afternoons, COVID has meant that classes run at 50% capacity to adhere to social distancing requirements. This means that we are currently only able to assist 40 children a day with academic support.

PARTNERSHIPS AND RESOURCES


The VUSA project was started by staff of a leading private boys school, Bishops Diocesan College. The programme has provided opportunities for peer learning programmes between Bishops and VUSA children. As the programmes has grown, more Bishops staff have expressed an interest to support the programme (including the Bishops Council and The School Executive). Bishops funds all of the programme's operational expenses and oversees all finance, governance, administrative and HR processes.

VUSA is therefore in a privileged position to have access to some of the countries leading educators, and materials as well as a community of children who desperately require access to an excellent education. VUSA has formed close relationships with schools in the Langa community - All that is missing is an accessible facility from which to operate. With the Digibus - the possibilities are limitless.


DIGIBUS IMPACT

HOW WOULD THE DIGIBUS IMPACT THE PROGRAMME

The addition of a bus equipped with computers would ensure that VUSA could extend and provide greater impact to the existing academic programme, utilizing Bishops expertise and materials to provide more children in Langa access to digital learning opportunities. This could open up a space for staff development and shared learning as well as workshops for parents.

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW



MORNING PROGRAMMES

VUSA would like to pilot a programme introducing an 'English as a Second Language' (ESL) programme for primary school learners. Increasing English vocabulary and reading skills would have a knock on effect on all other subjects. If school time-tables allowed for it we would also offer Maths through the Cami programme - continued research on needs and how best to tackle support interventions would be ongoing.



AFTERNOON PROGRAMMES

VUSA currently provides English and Maths support for 200 children per week This could extend to provide additional lessons to participants. The existing programme reinforces concepts taught at school. New programmes could be introduced utilising online Maths and English worksheets from the Bishops curriculum. Other programmes which could be introduced include:

- additional peer learning programmes
- additional skills such as robotics / coding

• basic computer training – an essential skill in today's society and one not all children have access to.



WEEKEND PROGRAMMES

- This space could also allow for online staff training programmes to upskill our teachers and coaches (who all reside in the community) as well as staff from local schools.
- Parent training programmes this could provide a space to teach parents tools to support their children with homework.
- Matric preparations programmes
- Coding programmes
- Reading and Writing Programmes



PEER LEARNING PROGRAMMES

Peer learning programmes – this is one of the greatest impacts of the Bishops / VUSA partnership allowing children from both communities to teach and learn from each other. Classes could be set up on Teams or after COVID in person between Bishops children and VUSA children.

ENGLISH AND MATHS LESSONS - MORNING PROGRAMMES

After-School Programme

Edunova Maths and English Programme extended to this programme - supported by VUSA Teacher. Cost: R5,500

Teacher / Staff Training Programmes to show parents how to support children with homework. Matric workshops (Matrics in Langa could join online workshops with boys /staff from Bishops to work through old Matric papers.) Coding Workshops CV writing and soft skill workshops Cost dependent on training offered - where possible volunteers would be used.

Bishops Support

Parking - Bus to be parked on Bishops campus at night, weekends, holiday IT Support - The IT department have pledged to provide start-up support. Insurance - Premium significantly less if added to Bishops Fleet. Volunteer Staff Access to learning material

Part of the daily programme is a warm meal at 5pm. This amounts to 500 meals served per day by Vusa




As a progressive organisation, Vusa aims to have a mixed gender rugby and education programme.
